An Explanation of Fees for Credit Classes

Course Fees: Some courses include a fee that covers additional instructional costs for that class. These may be charged on a per-course or per-credit basis, and are listed with the specific class to which they apply.

Lab Fees: Lab fees are charged for classes that have supplies and materials used by students each term for specific classes.

Program Fees: Program fees are charged for limited entry programs that have higher operational costs.

Service Fees: Service fees are universal fees charged per credit intended to replace fees such as student activity fees, technology fees, and parking fees.

Paying for Classes

Payment is due on the first Friday of the term, unless a payment arrangement has been made with the business office.

When Can I Register?

Registration priority is based on the number of credits successfully completed at CGCC. It does not include courses attempted or graded "F", "W", "I", "AU", or "NP," transfer credits, or classes currently in progress. Students may also register on any scheduled registration day or time after their priority day through the first week of the term. After the first week, students must obtain instructor permission to join a class in progress.

Financial Aid

Federal and State Aid

The Financial Aid Office at Columbia Gorge Community College can help you start your search for financial aid and help you through the paperwork required for Federal assistance. The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) application should be filed as soon as possible after October 1st each year and can be completed online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. The process can take 8-12 weeks from start to finish, so be prepared and file early. The earlier you file, the more benefits may be available to you.

2017-18 Award Year

The 2017-2018 award year began summer term 2017. The FAFSA is available now at www.fafsa.ed.gov When filing your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), use CGCC's school code (041519) to receive Federal Financial Aid at CGCC. The application for 2018-19 will be available October 1.

The ORSAA is an alternative to the FAFSA for undocumented Oregon students, including students who have DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) status. The ORSAA opens in October each year. Do NOT complete the ORSAA if you are a U.S. citizen or a legal noncitizen with an Alien Registration number. For more information please go to http://Oregonstudentaid.gov.

Registration does not require a financial aid award letter in place at the time students register. Students may select "pay later" on the screen which asks if they are paying for classes at the time they register. If the financial aid process is not completed, or the student is not awarded funds, the student is responsible for full payment.

Computer access and assistance with online filing is available in both The Dalles and Hood River. Students can also schedule an appointment to discuss their financial aid progress by calling Student Services at (541) 506-6011 or by emailing the financial aid office at financialaid@cgcc.edu

The GED test is computer-based and provides adults with the opportunity to earn a high school credential, but it also measures essential career-and-collegereadiness skills. Students under 18 years old are required to have a Release from Compulsory Attendance signed by their high school before they can register. There are four tests: literacy, mathematics, science, and social studies. The GED is a stepping-stone toward a college classroom or a better career and a family sustaining wage job. GED test fees are \$38 per test. Full cost of GED tests is \$152. To take an official GED test, please register online at www.ged.com.

GED Preparation

CGCC offers GED reading & writing, mathematics, social studies and science classes all aimed at providing the knowledge, skills, support and guidance needed to pass the GED. These classes develop the skills necessary to pass the GED tests and prepare students to enter college and/or the workforce. Students attend a MANDATORY GED New Student Orientation for 6 weeks prior to the start of the term where they will take the CASAS test and register before attending classes. Drop or Withdraw from a Credit Class

- If a student drops a class in the first week, the class will not appear on the transcript.

*BLS CPR & First Aid Instructor Training Program

The American Heart Association BLS Instructor is authorized to teach both the Heartsaver community level provider classes and the BLS for Healthcare Providers CPR course. Prior to enrolling in the BLS Instructor course, you must have the following: A current BLS for Healthcare Provider CPR card, and the Heartsaver First Aid card.

The AHA Instructor Training course is a 4-step process:

Step 1: REGISTER FOR THE COURSE.

Step 2: SEND AN EMAIL TO THE CGCC INSTRUCTOR:

Email your contact information to Tessie Adams at tadams@cgcc.edu. You will be sent specific information on next steps in preparation for the ONLINE and IN-CLASS Discipline Specific Training portion of the course, including textbook purchase information. Be aware that the online portion has an additional purchase cost. The instructor can answer your questions.

STEP 3: DISCIPLINE SPECIFIC TRAINING

This part of the course is completed in 4-hour and 8-hour classroom sessions with other instructor candidates to become familiar with the AHA course options, materials, equipment, outlines, and teaching methodology. You will also demonstrate your ability to correctly and effectively perform CPR and use the AED. Textbooks are required and must be brought to class.

STEP 4: TRAINING CENTER AFFILIATION AND MONITORING/MENTORING

To complete the Instructor Training program, you must affiliate with a Training Center (TC), meet with the TC coordinator or lead TC faculty to discuss specific TC administrative policies and procedures, and then be monitored by a TC Faculty member while teaching your first class. What Are Allowed Methods Of Payment?

CGCC accepts cash, checks and VISA, MasterCard & Discover bank cards.

When is Payment Due?

- Por credit classes, full payment or college-approved financial arrangements must be in place by the first Friday of the term. If you enroll after that date, payment is due upon registration. If you have financial arrangements that will not cover the full term charges, you must pay the difference by the due date.
- pa For non-credit classes, full payment is due at the time of registration.

What Happens If My Account Is Past Due?

Past due accounts are assessed a late payment penalty of 10 percent of your account balance, up to \$75. Holds are placed on past due accounts, restricting future registration and transcripts. Past due accounts are referred to the Oregon Department of Revenue or other outside agency, and may be subject to additional collection charges, attorney fees and credit impairment. The college reserves the right to withdraw you if your account becomes past due or has an unpaid balance from a prior term.

What Are My Payment Responsibilities? You are responsible for full payment of all charges on your account by the payment due date, even if your account is being

due date, even if your account by the payment due date, even if your account is being paid by another party. You are responsible for keeping CGCC informed of any address and telephone changes. Even if you are under 18 years of age, you will be held liable for any charges on your account under ORS 348.105. When you register for a class, you are liable for payment of the charges on that class, whether or not you attend. To have the charges removed, you must personally drop the class by the drop deadline.

How Can I Pay In Installments?

The Installment Plan allows you to pay half of your tuition and fees by the first Friday of the term, and defer the balance until the sixth Friday of the term.

To qualify for the Installment Plan, you must meet all of the following requirements: provide your valid social security number, have a satisfactory payment history, and a zero account balance. CGCC may deny or rescind an Installment Plan if you miss the required payment due dates, provide inaccurate or incomplete information, have a poor credit history with the college, or do not meet the eligibility requirements.

How Do I Pay With My Financial Aid?

If you have received and returned your award letter, financial aid awards will be posted to your account. If your award exceeds your account balance, you will receive a refund check by mail. If your award is not enough to cover all term charges, you must pay the difference by the first Friday of the term. If your aid is delayed, you will need to pay by this date. How Does My Company Or Agency Pay? Arrangements for payment by an agency or company must be approved by the college before the term starts. Once arrangements have been made, take your payment authorization to the Business Office, or fax it to (541) 506-6052 before the term begins. The student is responsible to ensure that a payment authorization is on file by the payment due date, and for payment of any unpaid charges and late payment penalties.

How Are Scholarship Awards Applied To My Charges?

CGCC Foundation scholarship awards are posted to your account. Scholarship checks from private donors, service clubs, or schools are posted to your account. You are responsible for charges that exceed your award.

Discounts

Discounts for District Residents, age 65+

District residents of Hood River or Wasco Counties 65 years or older are eligible to receive a 50 percent tuition discount on both credit and adult continuing education classes on a seat available basis. Check the course description for eligibility since some classes may not allow tuition discounts. Discounts do not apply to full classes or to lab and other class fees. You will be notified if the class is full and the tuition discount will not apply. Request your discount at the time of payment or by calling the Business Office at (541) 506-6057.

Oregon Senior Option

Oregon residents 65 years old or older at the beginning of the term in which the course is offered are eligible for a 100% tuition discount to audit a course if the following conditions are met:

- Students will complete a Senior Tuition Waiver and Audit Request form with instructor signature.
- Senior option enrollment will be on or after the first day of term.
- The course must be a lower-division collegiate course.
- Senior Option students will not displace paying students.
- The maximum costs to be covered by an approved tuition waiver each term is the cost of 8 credits.
- All course fees are to be paid by the student.

Drop Dates, Refunds, & Removal of Charges

Charges:

Charges are applied to a student's account when the student registers for a class. All of the tuition charges associated with a class will be removed if the student officially drops within the refund period. Some lab fees are non-refundable. No charges will be removed if the student drops after the drop deadline.

Drop Deadlines For Credit Classes:

Credit classes must be dropped online, through the student account system. If a credit class is not dropped within the drop period, it will result in a "W" grade on the transcript, indicating a Withdrawal, and no charges will be refunded. Drop deadlines for full tuition refund are as follows:

- Students are entitled to a 100% refund, except for non-refundable lab fees, when a course is dropped during the following deadlines:
- ¤ 8-12 week classes: drop by the end of the first Friday of

the term.

- 2-7 week classes: drop by the end of the first day of the class.
- Ess than 2 week classes: drop before the first day the class meets
- No refunds will be given after the deadline.

If you believe an extreme hardship forced you to withdraw after the drop with refund period, or prevented you from dropping within the refund period, and you wish to petition for a removal of charges, see the section titled "Refund Requests After the Drop Period," later in this section.

Drop Deadlines For Non Credit Classes: Non-Credit classes may be dropped online, in person at Student Services, or over the phone with a Student Services representative. Drop requirements may vary for Community Education courses. Drop deadlines for full tuition refund are

Policies and Notifications

as follows:

Students are entitled to a 100% refund, except for non-refundable lab fees, when a course is dropped during the following deadlines:

- * Class that meets 1-2 weeks: drop prior to the first session
- * Class that meets 3 or more weeks: drop prior to the second session
- * No refunds will be given after the deadline

Refund Requests Within the Drop Period:

The Business Office automatically issues refunds to students who drop within the drop period. The refund process as follows:

- Refunds from tuition and fees are first applied to outstanding charges on the student's account. If the student receives financial aid and opted to charge books on his/her account, this will also be deducted prior to any refund.
- If the credit is the result of a payment by check or cash, a check is issued in the student's name.
- If the credit is the result of a bank card payment, the refund will be applied to the original bank card.
- Refunds resulting from check overpayment are held two weeks from the date of the original payment.

Refund Requests After the Drop Period:

If an extreme hardship prevented you from completing a course, and you could not drop during the refund period, you may request to have tuition charges removed from your account. Fees, especially any non-refundable lab fees may not be refunded. A Tuition Appeal form for requesting a refund can be obtained from the Student Services office in The Dalles or Hood River. You will be asked to provide documentation circumstances to support your claim. Your and all accompanying documentation, must be received by the filing deadline to be considered. Please see the form for more details.
